



2022-2023 Scholarship Timeline

1. Application available September 1, 2022.
2. Application Deadline December 1, 2022.
3. Applications reviewed for eligibility and compliance with the instructions.
4. Applicants notified of their status.
5. Finalists provide supplemental information.
6. Scholarships awarded March 2023. Eligible Finalists not awarded a scholarship receive \$1,000.

Eligibility Requirements

1. Must be a citizen of the United States.
2. Must attend a public high school located in a city or town having fewer than 25,000 residents and whose outer boundary does not abut the outer boundary of another city or town.
3. Must have a 3.50 cumulative grade point average.
4. Must rank in the top 20% of the graduating class.
5. Must enroll at an eligible four-year college or university the first semester following high school graduation.
6. Must maintain a four year or less graduation schedule.
7. Must work 240 hours during the twelve months prior to fall semester college enrollment.
8. Must provide the FAFSA SAR showing the EFC.
9. Must apply for Federal and State grants if eligible.
10. Must not have a felony conviction.

The average Hagan Scholar is ranked 9th in a class of 107 students.

The Hagan Scholarship is a nationwide need-based merit scholarship designed to help rural students graduate college debt-free.

The scholarship provides up to \$48,000 over four years to attend college and the opportunity to learn important life skills not typically covered in the school curriculum. Hagan Scholars are attending colleges and universities located in 48 states.

Recipients must attend a public high school located in a city or town having fewer than 25,000 residents and whose outer boundary does not abut the outer boundary of another city or town.



Purpose

The Hagan Scholarship is designed to provide each recipient with the opportunity to obtain a four-year college education and graduate debt-free. The workshops, study abroad and investment accounts provide recipients with a practical understanding of important life skills not typically covered in the school curriculum.

Recipient Responsibilities

1. Must maintain a four year or less graduation schedule.
2. Must maintain a 3.25 CGPA.
3. Must earn fourteen credit hours each fall semester and thirty credit hours each academic year excluding summer school.

To be fair to all recipients we will not make exceptions to the scholarship criteria.



Scholarship Particulars

1. The disbursement amount will be determined each semester by HSF by taking the Total Cost of Attendance including tuition, fees, room, board, books, supplies, personal and transportation costs; then deducting the total dollar amount of ALL scholarships, awards, grants, waivers and one-half of recipient's EFC. Parents are not required to pay the EFC, the EFC is used only to determine the disbursement amount.
 2. The award amount will be adjusted each semester to offset the expiration or loss of other scholarships, awards, grants, waivers and changes in the recipient's EFC.
 3. The scholarship is renewable for up to eight consecutive semesters if the recipient fulfills the scholarship criteria and mandatory workshop responsibilities.
 4. First year recipients will receive \$1,000 prior to college enrollment to purchase essential items for college not covered by the scholarship; computer, cell phone, clothing, office supplies, bedding, etc.
 5. Second year recipients will be provided with \$1,000 to establish a personal brokerage account, and will be provided with a \$20,000 HSF brokerage account to manage until graduation, in order to learn first-hand how to invest to achieve financial security.
 6. Third year recipients who have achieved a 3.50 CGPA are eligible for an all-expense paid study and travel abroad experience worth up to \$8,000 or the funds can be used to study abroad for one semester.
 7. Recipients graduating college in fewer than eight semesters can use the remainder of their Hagan Scholarship to attend graduate school. Full time graduate students receive \$6,000 each semester. There is no limit on how many credit hours a recipient can earn.
 8. Recipients must work 240 hours during the twelve months prior to fall semester college enrollment. Employment must be regularly scheduled work performed under supervision for compensation.
 9. There is no application fee or processing fee.

Is this a need-based or merit-based scholarship?
BOTH. Applicants must authenticate financial need in order to attend college. Scholarship recipients are selected based upon academic ability, achievement in and out of school, personal goals and future promise.

Why do you have mandatory workshops?
The mandatory workshops are intended to help recipients obtain a practical understanding of important life skills not typically covered in the school curriculum. Workshops are currently Online due to COVID.

Why are recipients required to work?
The Grantor worked during high school and college and believes each recipient will personally benefit by contributing to the cost of his or her education.

Why are the scholarships limited to public schools located in rural areas? The Grantor attended four small public schools located in rural areas.
